**Major Violations**: Recognized by the faculty as a violation of significant concern, warranting at minimum the student's automatic failure of the course designated as "FC" (Failure due to Cheating) on the student's transcript and academic probation. A major violation assigned in an individual course results in the automatic failure of the course. Note that a major violation will be recorded in the Office of the Dean of Students, reported to the Vice President for Academic Affairs; and may follow the full academic chain of command for appeals (an academic integrity appeal should be documented on the Academic Integrity Appeal form).
